




An Introduction to the R-Ladder

In 2025 the RCA started socializing the R-ladder, a visual tool that ranks material management strategies based on how circular they are. The R-Ladder features 10 activities, organized by how efficiently they maintain materials in circulation:

Higher on the ladder: More circular approaches with shorter, more efficient loops that quickly return materials to productive use.

Lower on the ladder: Less circular approaches with longer loops, which take more time, energy, or resources to bring materials back into productive use.

Explore Circularity Day

In 2025, the RCA launched Explore Circularity Day. Explore Circularity Day is a new concept where, once a year, the RCA will explore a circular economy topic in greater detail. In 2025, we dove deeper into the topic of waste-to-energy (WTE) and its role in Alberta's circular future, discussing all sides of the perspective, to help explore and make decisions on the topic moving forward.

Explore Circularity is an event designed to provide a platform to explore complex topics and serve as a forum to ask questions and learn from others. It is a day to gain technical insights from experts, access practical tools to support decision-making, and learn from the experiences of jurisdictions that have investigated, made, or implemented decisions already. ECD 2026 will take place in Calgary in March and the topic is textiles.







Webinars

The RCA hosted several webinars to help members learn and discuss key issues. These included: two webinars on difficult to divert materials with CWMA in the fall of 2024, a webinar on expanding organics processing capacity in Alberta in November of 2024, a webinar on December 16, 2024 on the timelines and implementation of EPR with Alberta Municipalities and the Rural Municipalities Association, and one on empowering diverse communities in the circular economy in September of 2025.

Create Opportunities

EPR

On April 1, 2025 Alberta welcomed the official start of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). Through the hard work of many advocates, producers, municipalities, recyclers, oversight bodies and partners, this regulation kicked off for packaging and paper products (PPP) (or blue bin recyclables) as well as hazardous and special products (HSP).

EPR shifts the responsibility from the municipality to the producer of products and packaging to ensure the materials are properly managed at the end of the material life cycle. One of the aims of EPR is to give producers an incentive to change product design to create less packaging and design it to be more easily recyclable. Producers can continue to look for efficiencies and savings to collect and recycle the packaging while building economies of scale (as they will manage all the PPP materials for the entire province and build scale on a national level).

We're excited to see where it goes from here and continue to support the roll out.

Work Integrated Learning Hub

In September the Recycling Council of Alberta launched a new member resource: the <u>Work-Integrated Learning (WIL) Hub</u>.

The <u>WIL Hub</u> connects the RCA's 330+ members with Alberta post-secondary institutions, making it easier for circular economy organizations to access student talent for internships, co-ops, mentorships, applied research, community service learning, and other WIL opportunities. This initiative helps members access student support, helps colleges and universities achieve employment outcomes, and provides students with valuable real-world experience. 

Strengthen our influence

INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Members of Recycling Council of Alberta

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Recycling Council of Alberta (the Council) that comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2025, and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO), and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Conclusion

In common with many charitable organizations, the Council derives revenue from donations and fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to us obtaining evidence we considered necessary for the purpose of the review. Accordingly, the evidence obtained of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Council. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the year ended March 31, 2025, current assets and net assets as at March 31, 2025. Our review conclusion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2024 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation of scope.

Qualified Conclusion

Based on our review, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Conclusion* paragraph, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Recycling Council of Alberta as at March 31, 2025, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended March 31, 2025

PURPOSE OF THE COUNCIL

Recycling Council of Alberta (the "Council") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated provincially under the Societies Act of Alberta. As a registered charity the Council is exempt from the payment of income tax under Subsection 149(1) of the Income Tax Act.

The Council promotes and facilitates waste reduction, recycling and resource conservation in the Province of Alberta. The Council was formed in 1987 and was registered as a charity in 1995.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

Fund accounting

The financial statements have been classified into the following funds:

Unrestricted Fund

The unrestricted fund accounts for the Council's program delivery, support and administrative activities.

Invested in Equipment Fund

The invested in equipment fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenditures related to the Council's capital assets.

Equipment

Equipment is stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization and is amortized over its estimated useful life at the following rates and methods:

Computer equipment 55% declining balance method Equipment 20% declining balance method Website 25% straight-line method

Equipment acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

Revenue recognition

Recycling Council of Alberta follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Membership dues revenues are recognized on a straight-line basis over the term of the membership.

Other revenues are recognized in the period they are earned and collections are reasonably assured.

Contributed services

The fair value of contributed or volunteer services cannot be reasonably determined and are therefore not reflected in these financial statements.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the estimated useful lives of equipment, allowance for doubtful accounts, deferred contributions and accrued liabilities.

9. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Council is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the Council's risk exposure and concentration as of March 31, 2025.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a third party to a financial instrument might fail to meet its obligations under the terms of the financial instrument. The Council's financial assets that are exposed to credit risk consist primarily of cash, term deposits and accounts receivable. The Council's cash and term deposits are maintained with a large federally regulated financial institution. The Council, in its normal course of operations, is exposed to credit risk from its customers. The amounts due are from a variety of customers and government agencies. The Council is not subject to significant concentration of credit risk with respect to its customers.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Council is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its customers and other related sources and accounts payable.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument might be adversely affected by a change in the interest rates. The Council's interest-bearing assets include cash and term deposits.
